To all Students, Families, Staff and Community Members

Welcome to this week's newsletter. It is a busy time of year for everyone at our school, with several key dates and projects culminating over the next few weeks. For our secondary students, Semester 2 starts this week for all semester subjects, with some classes changing over. It is also report writing time and staff are hard at work ensuring every student is given the opportunity to have their effort reflected in their final Semester 1 Report. Thank you to the parents, families and community who continue to support our students to be successful.

Water Leak

As many of you are aware, a water leak in the fresh water supply has developed under the main secondary building. We were alerted to this when a staff member found water gushing out from behind the bathrooms in the Ag area. Since it was discovered, there have been multiple plumbers attending the school to isolate and repair the leak. During this time, our priority has been to keep everyone safe and ensure drinking water and toilets are available. We are very fortunate to have multiple toilet blocks and more than one water line to the school, which has meant the school has been able to remain open to continue learning for our students. While the repair work has not yet been completed, the Department facilities coordinator and plumbers are working to get this done as soon as possible. I am very appreciative of the patience of our staff and students whilst drilling work was undertaken last week to locate pipes — with some classes temporarily relocated for a few lessons. Hopefully the ongoing works will fix the issue soon.

Student Free Day

At our recent Student Free Day, staff training focused on curriculum planning to ensure quality teaching for every student, in every class. Teachers engaged in collaborative discussion to develop a planning template which is being used across all classes in the school. This was a follow on from individual meetings teachers had this month with Melissa Claridge, the partnership curriculum leader to build our curriculum delivery. A key focus of this day was incorporating Learning Intentions (what the lesson is about) and Success Criteria (how students will know they have learnt it) into our plans for current units and into Term 3. Admin staff worked with Kristen from Daymap to ensure our system is correctly setup and developed improved processes for daily tasks. Teachers finished the day learning about making rubrics in Daymap for students to see their progress and receive feedback on their learning. We aim for this information to be available to parents/families in the future so it is clear how each child is tracking in their learning throughout the semester, not just at reports time.



External School Review

As part of the Department for Education commitment to see every school improving, our school will complete an External School Review in Week 1 of Term 3. The review aims to investigate how the school has gone progressing its improvement goals since the previous review in 2019 and will provide us with directions to



support improvement for the next 3 years. During this process, the review team will meet with some of our students, parents and staff to support their investigation and report. The review will be based upon lines of inquiry linked to the domains of Expert Teaching, Quality Leadership, Conditions for Optimal Learning and School Improvement Planning. I am awaiting confirmation from the review team when the parent/caregivers meeting will be and will send this out via SMS — we are hoping to align it with the end of the school day to make it easier for those travelling in picking up children.



Preschool Upgrade

After many months of planning, we are finally getting the Preschool Upgrade underway in the next few weeks. This project commenced planning under Mike last year as part of the amalgamation of East Murray AS and has now progressed to the works stage. The upgrade works includes development of new bathrooms for the preschoolers, opening up of the rooms to provide

more space and a complete refit of the kitchen and play spaces. This project will be one of the largest works KAS has seen in a long time, with the final project launching a new Early Years Hub that will serve our community for many years to come. The first part of the works is the removal of asbestos which will be occurring during the July school holidays to avoid any students or staff coming into contact with the fibres. Whilst the building works happen, the preschool class are relocating to the school gymnasium for Terms 3 & 4. This building was our only option for relocation due to the standards board requiring there be 2 toilets in the same building as the preschool. We are grateful for the District Council in allowing our students to access the Institute during PE lessons when indoor play space is required. While this works means we are relocating students and furniture this week, we will be able to settle into the temporary site ready for Term 3 and look forward to once the project is completed.

Artificial Intelligence

At our recent Governing Council meeting, there was discussion about the rise of AI technology and its impact on student learning. There was reference to ChatGPT and how this could impact student assessments, particularly at a senior school level. In South Australia, the government has decided not to ban the use of this new technology, instead supporting its use in schools as a tool that we must train students to use appropriately. The SACE board, who oversees all Year 12 assessments, has upgraded their online exam browser to ensure students are not able to access any materials whilst doing an electronic exam. It raises important questions in schools about developing meaningful learning and how we ensure students complete their own work. Part of the work our staff are doing in curriculum planning addresses this, by making clear the

success criteria and monitoring student progress throughout the task (not just accepting the final piece). There is definitely a place for AI in learning where it can be used to summarise, simplify or collate information into ways that are easier for students to understand. As teachers, we are looking at how this technology might help us provide examples of completed tasks that students can unpack together and used to develop their own responses. For our school, our teachers know each student and, like other forms of cheating that may have been used in the past, they are able to recognise if the work belongs to the student. We will continue to work with our students to understand the benefits and limitations of these new technologies to support them being digitally literate citizens.

Events This Week: Primary Assembly

This Tuesday we welcome families along to our **Primary assembly at 2:25pm in the Gymnasium**. It will be the last whole school event in the Gym for a while, as the preschool class relocate into here later this week. We are committed to continuing our regular assemblies next term and will notify families via the newsletter of the new location once this has been decided.

Year 9/10 Students - Murray Bridge VET Trade Centre

In Week 7, the Year 9/10 students took part in an excursion to the Murray Bridge Vet Trade Centre. The excursion enabled students to experience some different VET courses that are offered. The students were exposed to the Doorways to Construction, Child Studies and Hospitality courses. Karoonda Area School will offer more opportunities for students in the Senior School to undertake Vocational Education and Training (VET) as an integral part of their studies toward completion of their South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE). VET refers to national vocational qualifications that are endorsed by industry. VET qualifications provide opportunity for students to develop specific industry related skills. Students with VET qualifications are well prepared to take on apprenticeships (including School Based Apprenticeships), further education and training. Some fully completed VET courses, at Certificate III level or above can contribute to an Australian Tertiary Rank (ATAR) which is required for entry into University. TafeSA recognises SACE completion as meeting the entry requirements for most of its courses. It also considers a variety of qualifications, including VET and experiences in its entry selection process.

What is Career Education and Guidance?

Career education is the progressive development of career management competencies through learning experiences which assists students to make informed decisions about their study and work options and support them to successfully manage their career across their lifetime.

Career guidance is individualised, and impartial advice provided by a qualified career practitioner that supports a student to evaluate and make decisions about their pathway. This guidance helps to develop new perspectives and move students from a general to a more focused and specific understanding of life and work.

High quality career education and guidance is central to the role schools play in preparing young South Australians for their future. It strengthens a student's ability to make well-informed decisions, manage their own careers, and successfully transition from school to employment and further studies

At Karoonda Area School Career Education is offered to students from years 7 – 12 through a number of ways:

- An explicit Career Education lesson once a week (years 7 9)
- The PLP and Work Place Practices (year 10)
- Course Counselling and VET pathways years 10 12
- It is also incorporated in learning across all subjects of the curriculum

The Career Learning Outcomes Framework (CLOF)

The Career Learning Outcomes Framework is the scope and sequence (map) that is used to plan for the resources developed by Department for Education to support schools to design and deliver a quality career education program.

All the recommended resources and activities are informed by three key documents:

- Professional Standards for Australian Career Development Practitioners
- Guiding Principles for Career Development Services and Career Information
- Australian Blueprint for Career Development

All the resources on this website are in line with the CLOF. Within our Career Education programs students at Karoonda Area School will be engaging in a range of activities on this website.





Figure 2 The home page of the DfE Student Pathways website

NATURE PLAY INCURSION

A MESSAGE FROM PRIMARY LEADER EMILY EDWARDS



Last week, students in Reception to Year 6 were fortunate to have representatives from Nature Play SA come visit Karoonda Area School. Nature Play SA is a not-for-profit organisation that inspires the South Australian community to engage with nature in creative, sustainable, and meaningful ways. Their core belief is that spending time in nature fosters deeper connections with the environment and ourselves. And as curiosity and wonder transform into a desire to learn, a new world of understanding, appreciation, and respect can unfold.

The incursion started in our mini scrub area, initially embracing the drizzling wet weather that mother nature provided. Unfortunately this was short lived and we had to relocate to the gym as rain settled in! Not ideal for Nature Play, however our students certainly made the most of the experience.

Students were involved in a Mobile Cubby Building workshop where the Nature Play representatives had provided many materials for building, starting with large sticks to begin their structures. They had to create shelter for their group. Our students thoroughly enjoyed this experience!

The children were showing a great deal of creativity, cooperation and resilience. It allowed students to use natural, open-ended resources to problem solve, design and build imaginative cubby creations. The teamwork and enthusiasm shown was exceptional and they didn't want to stop!































YEAR 3/4 UPDATE

HASS
























Literacy

In literacy students have been improving their writing through developing more complex sentences and learning about paragraphing. This week we have been using conjunctions to join clauses, where students quickly grasped the concept and were able to create sentences with up to three clauses! We are now working on transferring this into their bookmaking.







Students have really enjoyed bookmaking this term, embracing the creative freedom and showing their personalities through their writing. Bookmaking is a motivating way for the students to practice new learning and develop their skills as authors.

Recently, Emily shared her 'Would You Rather' book that she has written. We made this into an interactive brain break where Emily read her book to the students and they moved around the room to select which option they would rather! Emily was thrilled to see all the students so entertained by her book!





The Arts

Last week in The Arts with Miss E. students were learning the dance element of mirroring. Students worked in pairs to mirror hand and body movements. When reflecting on the activity as a class, students made a connection to their learning from The Resilience Project lessons and said that during the activity they were being mindful and felt very relaxed. We are always so impressed when students make connections like these!





YEAR 5/6 UPDATE

WELCOME GRETA & WINNIE!

The year 5/6 class would like to make a special mention to the newest additions to our class, Winnie and Greta Spry who have joined us at Karoonda Area School this week. The girls have already had a positive impact on our classroom and they are settling in well.

LITERACY

In literacy, students have started to wrap up our fantasy and short story writing units with some excellent texts created! Our focus in year 5 has now moved to discovering what makes a news and feature article and the different elements that are used to create them. Meanwhile, our year 6s will be looking at how advertising in the media can be used for both positive and negative effects.

NUMERACY

In numeracy we have been looking at number and algebra, and time. In number and algebra, we have continued working on our fluency with weekly rocket math, addition and subtraction strategies such as split and jump strategy. Students have also been further developing their understanding of fractions, making equivalent fractions using multiplication and division and using addition and subtraction to make fractions with like denominators.

In time, students have been looking at converting between the 12 and 24 hour time systems and have started their assessment on creating their perfect day using every minute of the day as well as mapping out key events over the past 20 years.

This terms SEPEP unit has now come to an end. All four teams putting in a huge effort as they made their way through the final stages and games. Ultimately the teams were so close in skill level, the championship match had to be decided by a game of rock, paper, scissors. The Boas proving victorious through the tournament games. 














INITIALIT-2




