To all Students, Families, Staff and Community Members

Welcome to this week's newsletter and to Term 3.

The weather is starting to show signs that spring is on the way and the season of new life. A time to dust off from the winter darkness and enjoy the sunshine. There is so much happening every week to continue our school's growth and improvement; I know you will find many points of interest in this newsletter.

External School Review

In Week 1 of this term, we had a review team from the Department for Education spend 2 days at our school, meeting with students, staff and parents to see how our school is improving and implementing previous directions as part of the 3-year review cycle. The review team found many great things happening at Karoonda and were very impressed with the amount of growth staff have undertaken this year so far. They repeatedly commented how articulate, well-mannered and knowledgeable our students are and the supportive nature of our community. Whilst the final report is yet to be published, the draft indicates that we are succeeding in delivering quality teaching and learning programs and it indicates that we are to continue with the work we have started, to strengthen and consolidate our improvement. A very positive outcome and much thanks to everyone involved.

NAPLAN Results

The 2023 NAPLAN student reports have been sent home at the start of this term. This year, the national standards have been reset by the Federal Government to simplify student achievement for families to see more clearly how their child is progressing. The new levels are Exceeding, Strong,



Developing and Needs additional support. Whilst we are yet to have the opportunity to unpack this data as a staff group, the overall school report indicates that we continue the school's history of strong academic performance. Against the national standard, our students achieved Strong proficiency against all test strands, with a few students Developing in Year 9 spelling and grammar. As reflected in the Review Report, our focus on teaching and learning continues to make a difference for the students of our community.



Staffing Update

This term, we welcome Sonja Marchant to the role of Preschool Educator in a short-term contract filling behind Katelyn Boughen, who has taken long service leave. Sonja has been working as a relief teacher in our preschool and we are glad that she will be able to continue the strong learning program and provide continuity for the



preschoolers. Sonja has already contributed to the smooth start for our new preschoolers who started as part of the mid-year intake and will continue to support their growth.

This term, we welcome Kevin Addington to the Grounds Team, working alongside Heidi 2 days a week in maintaining our school facilities. We also welcome Jezzimay Tomkinson to the role of Playgroup Facilitator, who will enable Karen Wegner to resume her classroom support role.



2024 Leadership Team

From 2024, our school will operate under a new leadership structure, which enables us to secure roles for more than 12months to build continuity for each area of the school. We congratulate the following people and roles that have recently been announced:

Rebecca Eli.

Bec comes with a wealth of experience and knowledge, particularly with literacy development, having worked as a Literacy Coach across multiple schools, and takes up the position of Deputy Principal with a focus on Primary years and whole of school curriculum planning, assessment and reporting.

Alex Pfeiffer.

Alex has demonstrated a huge amount of growth this year in his first leadership position and we congratulate him on winning the ongoing role as Senior School Leader (10-12) with a focus on SACE/VET pathways and whole school timetabling. He has already shown innovation and improvement in developing pathways for students and we look forward to seeing how the new course counselling takes place over coming weeks.

The Middle School Leader (7-9) position closes this week and the panel process will commence. I expect to be able to announce this position later this term.

Preschool Upgrade

The Early Years Learning Hub project has started with the removal of asbestos during the school holidays. The building is down to the studs, a builder has been awarded the project and work is expected to start in the next week or so. The Preschool class have successfully relocated to the school gymnasium and are enjoying their new outdoor space in the corner of the oval. This project is expected to be completed this year and will provide new bathrooms designed for preschool age, new learning spaces, kitchen and an expanded outdoor area.



Water Leak

Since the end of last term, we had plumbers on site with higher powered technical equipment to locate and repair the water leak in the main building. After sending cameras and various technology through the pipework, they were able to find the leak in a pipe underneath the concrete slab in the middle of the main building.

The contractors have been working over the weekend to repair this leak, which included cutting through the concrete floor to access the pipework. Both the design and age of the building contributed to the complexity of this issue; however, the leak has now been repaired and the access to all bathrooms has reopened.

We are awaiting further direction from the Department and engineers if this leak caused any further damage to the bathrooms or building which may require follow up works.

The focus of this day will be on Numeracy improvement, with Kathy Palmer (numeracy consultant) working with staff, in addition to moderation of student work samples from Semester 1 to confirm work completed against the achievement standards.

Royal Adelaide Show

The Royal Adelaide Show is also fast approaching, and Carolyn is hard at work with the students, preparing and practicing for the events. Our school has a strong reputation for Agricultural success at the show and expect this to continue this year. The Mini Show Day is planned for Thursday 17th August.



Secondary School News

Digital Technologies

This term in Digital Technologies the Year 7-9 have been analysing and designing computer games. The Year 7/8's have been using Scratch to assess games for playability and exploring 'MaKey MaKey' as a game controller. The Year 9's have started exploring coding in Unity and this week have managed to import a starter project to design a car to travel along a road and avoid obstacles. They will be using the 'Design Lab' each week to build on growing their own game as they learn new skills.





8 – 10 English

In Mrs Manowski's English classes students are developing their knowledge and skills to be able to write effectively to inform and persuade. This has involved undertaking a number of activities to embed their knowledge of how different language devices are used to persuade and influence other people. They will then produce informative / persuasive texts. Some of these options include: advertising, a persuasive speech, a debate, a letter to the editor, an opinion column, or a feature news article.



7-9 Career Ed (Mrs Manowski and Mr Pfeiffer)

Students have been using the Education Department's Career Pathways Portal to "Learn about themselves": their skills / interests / learning styles / values / personality so that they can narrow down the types of careers that best suit them.

Year 11 English

Are composing a text response to the novel 'The Dressmaker', and to what extent it can be considered a gothic text.

Year 12 English

Have been planning for and considering descriptive writing, language features, narrative structure and conventions to begin composing a narrative from three points of view.

Year 12 Essential English

Selecting an already existing text and using different text transformation methods to construct a narrative text, taking into account structure, conventions and stylistic features.

Mr Roger's English and HASS Classes Year 7 English

Have been constructing a book review to last term's class novel 'Blueback' by Tim Winton.

Year 7 HASS

Are creating a research task related presentation about a hydrological or atmospheric hazard. Students are learning about hazard's cause, as well as social, environmental and economic impacts of it.

The Rhetorical Appeals – Ethos, Pathos and Logos are used to persuade:

ETHOS < Ethos is a Greek word meaning 'character'. In terms of persuasive language, it is an appeal to authority and credibility. Ethos is a means of convincing an audience of the reliable character or credibility of the speaker/writer, or the credibility of the argument.

It is an important tool of persuasion because if you can get your audience to see you (or your argument) as credible and trustworthy, it will be much easier to persuade them. As a doctor, 1 can say that this product & will certainly improve your health.



PATHOS

Pathos is a Greek word meaning 'suffering' or 'experience', and it is used in persuasive speech as **an appeal to the emotions** of the audience. *Pathos* is the way of creating a persuasive argument by evoking an emotional response in the audience/reader.

You can use *pathos* when trying to persuade, by appealing to an audience's hopes and dreams, playing on their fears or worries, or appealing to their particular beliefs or ideals.



Logos is a Greek word meaning 'a word' or 'reason'. In rhetoric, it is **an appeal to logic and reason**. It is used to persuade an audience by logical thought, fact and rationality.

Logos can be a useful tool of persuasion because if you can 'prove' an argument through logical and sound reasoning, your audience is more likely to be persuaded.

Design Technologies

The Home Economics room is in full swing this semester, accommodating three different classes: Year 8 Home Economics, Year 9/10 Home Economics, and Stage 1 Food and Hospitality. We had the good fortune of receiving a brand-new commercial fridge during the first week of school. This valuable addition will greatly assist in storing food preparation trays, ensuring they are ready for practical lessons. Furthermore, the fridge's capacity will prove particularly advantageous when our Food and Hospitality students engage in larger-scale catering projects.


Year 8 Home Economics

At present, the class is immersed in the theme of 'Let's

Lunch Locally,' with a strong focus on exploring the abundant produce that South Australia has to offer. Emphasizing the concept of 'low food miles,' the students are encouraged to consume food that is sourced from nearby regions. As part of this exploration, the students participated in a practical activity last Friday that highlighted apples as the hero ingredient. Apples, grown in the picturesque regions of the Adelaide Hills, Riverland, and South-East, took centre stage during the practical session. This hands-on experience not only allowed the students to appreciate the regional bounty but also promoted the importance of supporting local farmers and reducing the environmental impact associated with long-distance food transportation. Through such activities, the class gains a deeper understanding of the significance of sustainable and locally sourced food choices.

Apples were the hero of this dish. The Year 8 class made 'Apple Hand Pies'. They worked collaboratively in pairs, demonstrating a variety of techniques including peeling, cutting, measuring, coating, pre-heating, baking, cleaning and many more valuable skills.







Year 9/10 Home Economics

The class is currently exploring the theme of 'Nourish and Thrive.' At the beginning of this unit, students established personal goals, which will be revisited at the unit's conclusion. Throughout the course, the focus has been on understanding the nutritional aspects of food, including macronutrients and micronutrients. Recently, the students delved into the significance of dietary fibre and its role in daily nutrition. They learned why fibre is essential and



how it contributes to a healthy diet. In a recent practical session, the class prepared a dish that was not only rich in protein but also high in fibre, applying their newfound knowledge in a hands-on experience.







Stage 1 Food And Hospitality

The Food and Hospitality students have made significant progress in their first assignment titled 'Hazardous Chicken.' Last Friday, they successfully completed the related practical component of the assignment. Their task involved selecting a recipe that included chicken as a potentially hazardous ingredient. They then had to demonstrate their knowledge of safe food handling principles by preparing, packaging, storing, and transporting the dish to serve at home.

Through this assignment, the students are gaining valuable hands-on experience in ensuring food safety, which is crucial in the culinary world. This exercise allows them to apply theoretical knowledge in a real-world context and reinforces the importance of safe practices when dealing with potentially hazardous ingredients like chicken.

MATHEMATICS

Within Mathematics this term, we are studying number and algebra topics from Monday to Wednesday and another topic on Thursday and Friday, starting with measurement.

The children have impressed me with their introduction to breaking whole numbers into two groups leading to addition. It was great to see the students challenging themselves!





LITERACY

The children have really improved their ability to work independently during literacy groups while I am working with another group. They love our visual group rotation board that shows which activity they are working on. Students enjoy taking turns in moving the groups around each rotation.



HASS


In Humanities and Social Sciences this term, we are focusing on Geography. Our unit of work is Special Places and how we care for them. The photos below show the children working in groups matching smaller pictures of features of places to a particular picture of a place.



THE ARTS

In their Arts lesson with Miss Edwards, the students have been learning about some visual art elements such as line, shape and colour.

Over the past two weeks, students have been learning about all the different types of lines they can use in the artworks they produce. They discussed the lines they could see in the work of famous artists such as Piet Mondrian and Henri Matisse and have begun taking inspiration from their work. 
YEAR 1/2 UPDATE

MATHEMATICS


Throughout this semester, the Year 1/2 class has been actively delving into and reinforcing their understanding of numbers. One of their engaging activities is the 'Number of the Day,' where they immerse themselves in the intricacies of a specific number. They learn whether it is odd or even, how to spell, partition, expand, place it on a number line, and skip count from that number. A crucial aspect of this exercise is their hands-on experience using manipulatives to construct the number physically. With each passing day, the class is growing in independence, and they eagerly seek opportunities to challenge themselves further.







Having been introduced to the concept of fractions in their everyday experiences, the students are actively reinforcing their knowledge that fractions signify equal parts of a whole. They have now become confident at drawing a line on a shape to represent halves, demonstrating their ability to recognise and divide a whole into two equal parts.



Additionally, the students have been engaging in 'Maths Games' to strengthen their understanding further. These activities encompass skip counting by 2s, 5s, and 10s, enabling them to grasp number patterns more effectively. They have practiced subitising to make ten, solidifying their understanding of 'Friends of 10' and enhancing their mental calculation skills. Through these interactive learning experiences, the students better comprehend fractions and number relationships.

INITIALIT-2 UPDATE

Informative texts

In InitiaLit-2 students have been learning about Informative texts. They focused on the fundamental structure, and developed their skills in distinguishing facts from opinions. Each student selected an animal to research, creating an informative text and skillfully bringing their animal to life with dioramas. Students used their creativity and were inspired throughout the process.



YEAR 3/4 UPDATE


Mathematics

The 3/4 class have been challenged to think critically in mathematics so far this term. It has certainly been full steam ahead.


In the last week of term 2, the 3/4 class took on an exciting challenge: designing their own math board games. Each student had to come up with a unique concept, write clear rules as part of their literacy lessons on procedures, and create their game boards and materials. As the new term began, they played each other's games, which provided valuable insights. Students reflected on the process and gave feedback to each other. Throughout the process, the students remained highly engaged and motivated, making it a truly rewarding experience for everyone involved.



In the first week of the term students were posed a problem to solve. They were given the task to count how many lollies were on the page. Students had to think critically to use different strategies to solve the problem. To extend students, they were asked to justify the strategy they chose, explain how they solved the problem and how they can check to see if they are correct.



Students are working towards developing multiplicative thinking. They have been given time to explore arrays and how arrays connect to multiplication. Students have been doing many hands on tasks to develop the fundamental skills they require have a sound understanding of multiplicative thinking.



YEAR 5/6 UPDATE

Mathematics

To begin Mathematics this term, the year 5/6 class has begun exploring both measurement and statistics. We have started our measurement unit by looking at the different attributes be can measure such as mass, capacity, volume and distance. Students have then been looking at finding examples in their own lives and deciding which measurement they should use. In data, the students have been focusing on how and why we collect categorical data and have been learning how to interpret different types of graphs such as bar graphs, pie charts and dot plots.









English

At the end of term 2, the year 5/6 students began our topic on examining advertising in the media. To engage with the students prior knowledge, they were tasked with creating a still image advertisement on a brand that already existed or was yet to exist. This term we have had a deeper look at what makes a good advertisement and the features that make it effective. This has included the images that are used, the breakdown of company logos, and looking at the term 'adaptation'. To focus on adaptations, students were asked to group up and choose one of five adverts given and adapt it in a way that suited them. They were then tasked with giving reasons as to why they made those changes.



PE

In PE this term, the year 5/6 class have begun their sports study unit on European Handball. Throughout the term, they will be learning about the rules, the origin of the sport, the fundamentals, the equipment used, and most importantly; the skills to play it! So far we have been learning about the basics of moving around the field and the skills used to position ourselves to score.



PRIMARY STEM UPDATE











In STEM with Mrs Roberts, the Receptions have been learning to code Ozobots using colour codes. They recreated the story of the Hare and the Tortoise.

The Year 1/2's and 3/4's have been using Makers Empire to create design solutions. The Year 1/2's made bag tags and the 3/4's bookmarks.

Our Year 5/6's have began exploring EV3 robots and trying to make them move forward without wheels - very challenging!

Little Bang Discovery Club



Dear Parents/Carergivers,

NAPLAN 2023 - Student Results/Reports

Today you will be receiving your child's NAPLAN results. We wanted to share some important information with you before reading your child's NAPLAN report.

NAPLAN (the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy) is a national test undertaken by all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students, designed to provide information about student's literacy and numeracy achievements and areas for improvement. NAPLAN tests are one aspect of our school's assessment and reporting processes, they do not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about your child's achievement. Your child's teacher will have the best insight into your child's educational progress. NAPLAN results provide additional information, which can be used along with our other assessment and testing.

As a school we analyse NAPLAN data at a whole school, cohort (year level), and individual student level. This enables us to identify trends and to evaluate individual students' skills in key areas of literacy and numeracy, providing valuable information about their strengths and areas for improvement. Teachers then plan their teaching and learning programs accordingly to support each individual student's learning through quality teaching practice.

This year there have been changes to the NAPLAN reports to include new Proficiency Standards which commence from this year. Your child's NAPLAN report will show how your child is tracking against four achievement levels known as proficiency levels.

The proficiency levels are:

- · Exceeding: the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.
- Strong: the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.
- Developing: the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.
- Needs additional support: the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.



Therefore, "If your child is in the Strong or Exceeding category, it means they have demonstrated proficiency and that their literacy or numeracy skills are where they should be at this stage of their schooling. If your child has not yet achieved proficiency, then they will either be in the Developing category or the Needs additional support category." (ACARA CEO, David de Carvalho)

When you read your child's report, please take the time to celebrate the success that you see and/or identify areas for improvement. If your child is concerned with their results, remind them that NAPLAN isn't a pass or fail test and there are no rewards or penalties for the result your child achieves. Rather, their report is a point in time snapshot of their achievements in the important areas of literacy and numeracy and their results will help their teacher to provide additional support in their learning.

Below are some of the ways that our teachers *provide additional support* through quality teaching practice to meet learner's diverse needs:

- intentional teaching building on strengths, interests, ideas and needs
- explicit teaching
- gradual release of responsibility
 - ✓ modelling: I do it
 - guided instruction: we do it
 - ✓ collaborative learning: you do it together
 - independent learning: you do it alone
 - ✓ graduated tasks: easy tasks to hard tasks
- inquiry based learning
- cooperative learning working with others
- thinking routines strategies that can be used repeatedly to promote and support thinking
- scaffolding
- providing materials that reflect a variety of cultures, environments and settings such as those experienced by students from non-English-speaking environments.
- stocking the classroom with a range of quality resources to engage learners of different abilities
- providing alternative representations of resources
- visual and technological supports.
