Whilst there are a few large careers we will celebrate at the end of this year, we are excited to be able to offer increased subject choices and new approaches to learning from next year. There are still positions in Maths and Science yet to be finalised. We are also confirming which teachers will teach each primary class and hope to share this with everyone in coming weeks.



## **Numeracy Professional Development**

On Monday, teaching staff worked with Kathy Palmer, numeracy consultant, to review our student progress for the year and determine next steps in their growth and learning. These conversations included unpacking the PAT data (Progressive Achievement Tests) from the end of Term 3, as well as supporting teachers to build their numeracy knowledge to plan for every child to grow. Across the end of this term, teachers will be completing check in assessments and collating student progress to handover for 2024 classes.

## Student Free Day – Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> November



This Friday's Student Free Day is our annual review and progress check. Staff will spend the day reviewing student data (NAPLAN, PAT, A-E grades) against our Site Improvement Plan to check our progress against the goals and determine actions for next year. The day will also focus on the next steps in actioning our school vision statement and how we continue to develop the best learning and facilities for the students of our region.

## **Bushfire Preparation**

With spring underway, it is important that we all prepare for the upcoming bushfire season. A hotter, drier summer has been forecast, which increases the likelihood of bushfires with greater ferocity. Our school has a clear bushfire action plan in place and conducts practice drills throughout the year. In the event of an emergency, we will communicate with families via SMS and email, to enable our phone lines to remain free to communicate with emergency services. This footpath work was completed during the holidays, and along with the installation of our new school sign, contribute to the welcome of our front entrance.



## **Building 10 Upgrade**

During the holidays the team from Response Building Group worked on Building 10 (colloquially known as The Hub) to replace broken boards, fix rotten timbers and paint the building. This work now protects the building for future years and allows us to continue to utilise it as a classroom, saving it from deteriorating.





#### **Primary Assembly**

This Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> November at 2:25pm is our Primary assembly. This provides an opportunity for parents and community to see and hear about students learning across this term and celebrate the success of their progress. As the Preschool class are using the Gymnasium, our assemblies will continue to be held in the Canteen shelter with seating provided for the adults.



### PRESCHOOL UPDATE

We have been dabbling in different types of process art this term, which is a focus on the creative process and its discoveries, more so than simply the appreciation of the final product. We have used scrapers, PVA glue, glitter and a range of collage materials to create our masterpieces!

We also participated in the Aussie Bird Count in Week I to engage with our school community and the natural world. This involved exploring the school environment for 20 minutes to observe birds, identify them and record them on the Bird Life App. We had great discussions about the plovers on the oval, currently swooping everyone to protect their eggs. We even spotted come black cormorants flying over the dam, which are not often in our area! We visited Mr Byrne (maths/science teacher and bird enthusiast) in the secondary building to confirm some of the bird species and their names. Thanks for your time Mr Byrne!

The making table and role play areas are forever a hive of activity at Preschool. Our Hairdressing Salon and a range of new dress up items are regularly engaged with and the sheer amount of creative personal making projects are improving in quality, as the children develop new techniques modelled to them.

One of our most engaging experiences so far would have to be the pom pom and water tough tray with a range of utensils including scoops, strainers and lemon squeezers! Great for fine motor development and lots of natural numeracy concepts being explored. Collaboration and oral language promoted through trial and error and new discoveries while manipulating this equipment too! It is also a fantastic sensory experience and great for regulation-Mrs Wegner and I both became just as mesmerised and engaged in the play as the children.

We have also been highly engaged in making music, particularly with our new musical pat bells. Many children have already composed their own songs!

We also managed to get a sneak peek of the 'old' Preschool space as it is being renovated! From the Preschool yard fence we could see all the way through to the blockroom windows as walls have been removed to open the space for improved supervision. How exciting!

We look forward to presenting some of our personal projects and process art at Primary Assembly.

#### RECEPTION UPDATE

We have experienced a lot of absenteeism due to illness so far this term, but the children have worked well when in attendance, which is pleasing.

Highlights of the first two weeks have been the SACA lesson, play in our classroom, (a new making area and dental clinic have proved popular), and also play at the Preschool.

We have written holiday recounts and are presently making our own narrative texts in Bookmaking during creative writing.

A few focus areas this term are learning four sound words (CVCC) to read and write during InitiaLit lessons. C stands for consonant and V for vowel, so the types of words we are studying are camp, list, hand, etc. We simply love playing the Hot Potato game which helps us to learn these words.

Within Health we are studying the Child Protection Curriculum. I am using the text titled, 'My Body! What I say Goes!' The first lesson was about identifying when, where and who we feel safe with.

In HASS Geography we are making a whole class frieze of Karoonda's main street, after our walking excursion to the street late last term. We are continuing our study of places, why they exist, why they might be special and how they are cared for by ourselves and others.

Mathematically, we are revisiting most topics already studied across the year to grow our skills, knowledge and understandings in readiness for Year 1!

#### **Reception Arts with Miss Edwards**

Last term, students had Performing Arts lessons with Mrs Durdin.

Throughout the Arts this term, students are continuing on with learning visual art elements with Miss Edwards.

Students have been practicing their cutting skills, learning about the colour wheel and making abstract artworks through collage. Students have learnt about the famous artist Henri Matisse and his paper collage artworks.

They also visited the 3/4 class this week who showed them the artworks they made last term, also inspired by Henri Matisse. Gabby, Oliver, Brock and Jai shared their artist statements, detailing their process, the meaning behind their works of art and how they came up with the name.

It was great to see the older students discussing the work they had created and inspiring the receptions!

## YEAR 1/2 UPDATE

We have been excited to return to Term 4 with both Mrs. Roberts and Mrs. Boughen back in the classroom. Student enthusiasm for learning has been high and lots of personal goals being set and met.

In Maths, we have been learning to read an analogue clock - half past, quarter to and quarter past. This has been hands-on learning. In Number we are learning to group a collection of objects working towards repeated addition ready for multiplication and division next year. Alongside we are learning to count small collection of coins with a class shop being set up and students earning play money for showing class values. This fortnight good deeds have earnt 5c. This week's shop was a Fruit Shop run by Devon and Jylan who made fruit smoothies and sold for 20c for a half and 40c for a full. Their shop made a total fo \$2.









Teamwork has been a class goal of ours and this has been particularly evident in STEM. We are working on a Lego theme "Superpower" looking at energy sources, energy storage and energy consumption. The 1/2's are looking at ways they can save power in the classroom such as turning off lights when not in the room, turning off boards and shutting down laptops. They are then using Lego instructions to create 3 builds and then will design new ways of creating and storing power. Each lesson focused on teamwork, fun, collaboration and innovation.









The 'Resilience Project' this week was fun creating mimes of facial expressions. The skits were very entertaining and showed a mixture of emotions







## YEAR 3/4 UPDATE

#### Life education

At the end of last term, the 3/4 class were lucky enough to have a session learning about Cyber Safety. It was pleasing that so many of our students already having a good understanding about being safe online. All students were engaged and learnt many tips and tricks to ensure they are staying safe online.



#### **Mathematics**

In mathematics we have been learning about time and shape. Students have spent time investigating different properties of 2D and 3D shapes and sorting them into different categories. The have also been learning about standard units of time and played a memory game to consolidate their knowledge.





















#### **Cricket clinic**

In week 1 we had some people from SACA come and provide students with a quick cricket clinic. Students had a chance to practice their throwing and catching skills. They had a great time

#### HASS

Over the last term, we have been learning about the First Fleet. To conclude our unit students each made a chatter box incorporating interesting facts about the First Fleet.













#### **English**

The 3/4 class have been analysing and writing poetry this term. Students are highly engaged, learning how to write in various structures and use features such as alliteration, onomatopoeia and rhyming. Below are some examples of poems they have written so far!





## YEAR 5/6 UPDATE

#### MATHEMATICS


Although it is term 4, we have shown no signs of slowing down up here in the year 5/6 room. In numeracy we have been exploring our chances with probability. We have been investigating the probability of different outcomes and connecting our vocabulary to percentages, decimals and number lines. Students have also been connecting their knowledge of probability and chance through games such as 'Blocko' (shown below) and 'Greedy Pig' where students take chances and risks depending on different outcomes and knowledge of which numbers are most likely rolled on a twin set of dice.

In numeracy students have also been exploring capacity and volume and how they are connected. We have introduced the unit by using lupins to explore the capacity of different sized cylinders. As shown below, students used different sized measuring containers to, as accurately as possible, determine capacity in millilitres before converting to litres.










#### **ENGLISH**

In English students have been continuing their great work on their information reports on Australian animals. Exploring the role of hook and topic sentences, structure and subtopics. The students have delivered thorough reports. Look below to learn about the 'Laughing Kookaburra' and the 'Corroboree Frog' by Lily and Greta!



#### The Laughing Kookaburra

Did you know Kookaburras use their loud laughing call to establish territory among other Kookaburras? The Laughing Kookaburra has 2 main characteristics, they are its loud laugh and its pointy beak. Kookaburras have a large list of predators, which include both flying and ground animals. They can be found living in most parts of Australia and mainly in trees.

#### Characteristics

The Laughing Kookaburra has 2 main characteristics, its noisy laugh and its pointy beak.

The Kookaburras laugh means, it gives out a territorial call warns other birds to stay away. It warns other birds to keep out of the Territory. There might be danger approaching, such as humans or predators.

humans or predators.

The Kookaburra has a heavy and boat-shaped beak. They use their beak to catch their prey. The colour of a Kookaburras beak is black on top and light underneath. When the Kookaburras prey is approaching down on the ground, it dives down and swoops at its prey.

#### Diet/predators

The Laughing Kookaburra is a bird that has an equally long list of predators as it has prey.

The Laughing Kookaburra has many different predators. The Kookaburra's predators include the Wedge-Tailed Eagle, Cats, Brown Goshawks, Large Owls, Foxes and Grey Butcher Birds.

Being the largest Kingfisher in the world, the Laughing Kookaburra are carnivorous and have a long list of food sources. These include snakes, Lizards, Blue-Tongued Lizards, small mammals, frogs, rodents, bugs, beetles and worms. Although humans can't eat these things, they are really healthy for Kookaburras.










## What to do if you or your child has overdue or lost items

#### Middle School


Term 4 is now well underway and it is great to see our students are engaged and enjoying their learning across their subjects. Here are some snapshots of learning that has been happening:

#### Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 English

In each year level students have been learning about the creative language devices that are used to create poetry and songs.

The Year 7 students are learning about figures of speech: similes, metaphors, personification and structure. This will lead on to a song/poem analysis – identifying ideas, language features and stylistic features.

In Year 8 the students are creating their own poetry anthology, and are currently creating a ballad about a famous person, event, film or fairytale.



The Year 9 and 10 classes have been preparing presentations to demonstrate their understanding of ideas, stylistic features and language features (allusions and figures of speech) that are used in a popular song of their choice.

## **Year 8 Science**

Students have been learning about the physics of motion and are currently creating "mouse trap" cars to conduct some experiments.

We have planted some zucchini plants into the iFarm so that we can learn how to operate the watering system.






**Zucchini Growing in the iFarm** 

#### PE

In Term 4, Secondary Health and Physical Education classes have a strong emphasis on the program; SHINE. The purpose of Relationships and Sexual Health Education is to empower young people to make informed, safe, responsible, and healthy decisions through the acquisition of knowledge, the development of lifelong skills, and the exploration of values.



Relationships and sexual health education will include the following principles of best practice:

- Offer a positive and open view of relationships and sexuality in the context of respect, identity, growth and change
- Be respectful of diversity and inclusive for different cultures, religions, values, sexualities, abilities and identities
- Recognise and respect the importance of family as a source of sexual health information, education and values
- Use an approach that is supportive and non-judgmental with the aim to reduce risks in sexual relationships
- Be delivered within a safe, supportive environment through a whole-school approach
- Be comprehensive and of sufficient duration, breadth and depth to meet the learning needs of all students
- Encourage young people to delay sexual activity and recognise and respect the rights of young people to not be sexually active
- Be delivered in all education settings in a developmentally and contextually appropriate way starting before young people go through puberty
- Be delivered by an educator who is trained in the SHINE SA curriculum and has strong relationships with the young people they are teaching
- Be sensitive and responsive to young people who may have had unwanted or abusive experiences

We have been very fortunate to have to have had visitors to KAS offering workshops and information sessions for both our students and parents.

Our first was a visit from Life Education -many may remember Harold the Giraffe. Jade spent a couple of days with us and delivered various topics to our students. From:

It appears vaping is quickly becoming part of our society and it seems to becoming a trend with our young people, Jade was more than happy to educate our parents and caregivers as well.

Thank you to those parents who supported our parent session. They certainly went away well more informed than when first arriving. Secondly we had the Life Matters team visit two sessions to our students.

#### Year 3-6 **Friendship Matters**.

Through story, videos and activities they encouraged our young people to reflect on how to be a good friend. And discussed how to fix thing when a mistake is made in friendships. Friendships really do matter!

#### Year 7-11 Reputation Matters.

Talked about being wise when online and how to keep themselves and their friends safe. Through video and stories, they addressed concepts such as digital reputation and online safety and the impact on mental health.
