We all have the power to help make an extraordinary difference. Big or small, every donation counts!!



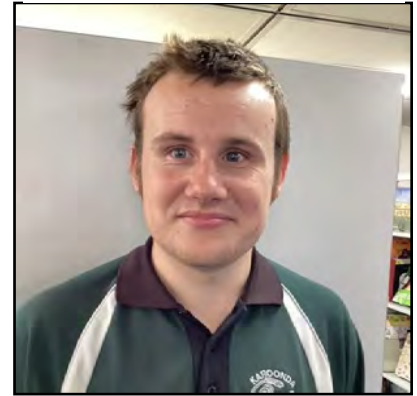

During weeks 3-6 the Receptions have been nearing the completion of various units of work for the term and revising topics and concepts within Maths and Literacy.

As part of our Geography unit, we have been looking at special places and how we care for them. A highlight has been caring for our naked tree garden in the school yard near our classroom. Our naked tree is fully clothed at present with its beautiful green Spring/Summer leaves. Another highlight was visiting the Preschool for a whole afternoon's play during week 4, while individual maths testing was being conducted. We also attended the whole school Remembrance Day ceremony, organised by the SRC representatives.

The children have lots they are looking forward to, with some class Christmas activities happening soon, daily swimming in week 7 and Primary Assembly later this week. They are generally showing their teachers that they are ready for the challenges of a new year level in 2024 and will experience two transition days in their new class during week 8.





YEAR 1/2 UPDATE

The Year 1/2's favourite subject - **STEM**. Lego is becoming a huge hit in our classroom with some students experiencing lego builds for the first time while others are experts and supporting their peers. We have now built an energy source, storage and different energy users. We are beginning to add motors to our builds and designing new uses of energy.



MATHS

In Maths we are working on Chance and Data; the possibility of something 'will happen', 'might happen' or 'will not happen'. We are earning 20c play coins in the room and our class shops that open on a Friday are becoming a hit - we all just wish we had more money! Our latest shops - Art Gallery, Cafe and Op Shop.



YEAR 1/2 UPDATE

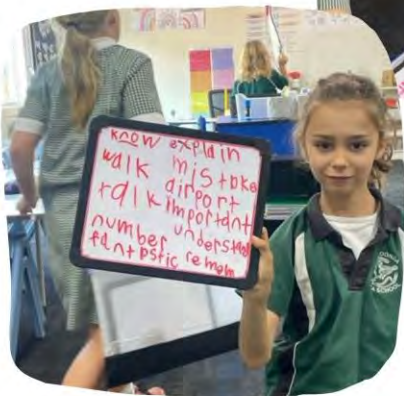
PE

In PE we have been working on attacking and defending and we were lucky enough to have the Meteors Lego League group come and teach us to play Tchoukball, which taught us to problem solve, work together and make space.



LIBRARY AND LITERACY

In InitialLit 1 we are finishing our last 3 lessons before commencing our review of the year. We are learning to spell 3 syllable words and the Library is becoming our favourite space with many readers now independently choosing novels of their own and using the library catalogue to place holds on books in other libraries around SA.



YEAR 3/4 UPDATE

Mathematics

In mathematics, students have shown great enthusiasm in learning to read analogue clocks. They have been diligently working to perfect this skill, and their efforts have paid off. All students have successfully learned to tell time to the nearest 15 minutes, some have been successful in telling time to the nearest 5 minutes, and a few have mastered telling time to the nearest minute.

We have been completing daily rotations to consolidate our new knowledge of time, as well as concepts covered earlier in the year.



Exploring Sustainability in HASS

In HASS, we have been studying sustainability and discovering ways to incorporate sustainable practices in our daily routines. Students are currently working on creating a pamphlet that highlights simple, yet effective tips and tricks for leading a more sustainable lifestyle.



Preschool Visit

We also spent some time in the preschool learning how to be a good buddy and role model. The students were fantastic role models and had a great time collaboratively exploring different learning stations.



The Arts

In The Arts, we made the most of the Melbourne Cup celebration by designing and creating some fascinators. Students started off by reading about the history of the Melbourne Cup and the traditions of fashion on the fields.

Literacy

In Literacy, the 3/4 class have been continuing on with analysing poetry and writing their own poetry anthology. Students have also been enjoying readers theatre in small groups to develop reading fluency and reading with expression. If all goes well, you may see this highlighted at this weeks assembly!

This year, the 3/4 class has also been participating in Miss Edwards' Amazing Reading Race for their home reading. A few students received certificates this week for making it to the next pit stop! As students are nearing the end of the year and getting tired, it is important for their growth that they continue to read regularly. Hopefully this race will continue to motivate students to read for the remainder of the year!

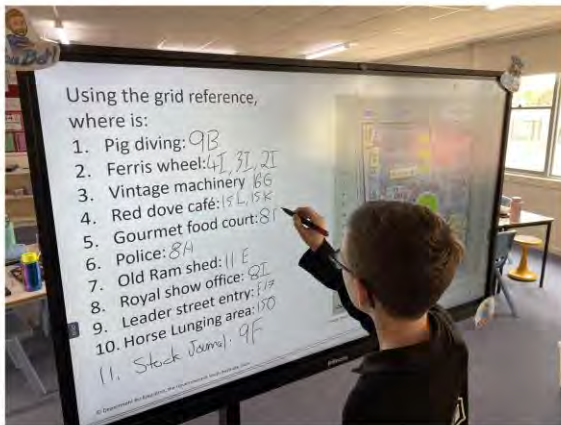


YEAR 5/6 UPDATE

Mathematics

In mathematics, the year 5/6s have rounded out successful probability and volume and capacity units with great results. A highlight was exploring the connection between millilitres and cubic centimetres through water displacement experiments and bucket filling sponge races.

Currently the students are diving head first into our location unit, exploring the use of grids and grid references. Students have been analysing different maps such as The Royal Adelaide Show and the City of Adelaide and making connections to specific locations using grid references. We have also been exploring this concept through the well known game of 'Battleships'.



English

In English the students have finished off our information report unit with fantastic posters they created on a dangerous animal of their choice (a few of them are on the next page).

We have started exploring poetry and what elements make up a poem. We have been creating similes and metaphors as well as analysing the poem 'Hist' to explore stanzas and rhyming patterns.

TOUCANS

Habitat


Toucans are typically found in tropical rain forests in South America. Did you know that toucans do not migrate when the seasons change? Toucans live in the rain forest because of a great canopy that keeps plenty of food and protection for the birds. Toucans live because of the individual characteristics of the bird. Because they live in such a hot biome it causes them to have trouble when flying around.

Predators

Toucans have 6 main predators: forest eagles, hawks, owls, bores, jaguars, and monkeys. These specific predators come from natural regions. These have enormous bills, they are used when attacking because it is hard for them to lose 100% control of their body checks. Did you know that a toucan has a loud voice and can be used to identify other toucans from potential predators.

Diet

Toucans can eat a variety of foods and berries are their favorite. They like most of the tropical fruits that they eat. They like to live in the rain forest because of the food that they eat. Toucans don't necessarily need a lot of food but the amount that they need each day comes from their food. A toucan gets most of its energy from insects, smaller birds, and small mammals.



~ Did you know that a toucan's large bill actually accounts for more than half of a toucan's body weight! ~

~ Did you know the biggest standing big and strong on trees, toucans can actually swim! ~

~ Did you know that there are over 40 species of toucan all over the world! One of the first (and most) characteristics of a toucan is its very colorful bill! That large colorful bill can get up to 17cm long! It's bill is usually bright orange but the Red-billed toucans have a bright green one with a variety of other colors. A toucan's wing span is an average of 104-154 cm wide. It can also go at a speed of up to 64 km/h. On average toucans usually live up to 18 years but they can get as old as 20 years!

Green Sea Turtle

The Scientific name for the Green Sea Turtle is *Chelonia mydas*.

Characteristics

Green Sea Turtles have dark brown, grey, or olive-colored shells and a much lighter yellow-to-white underside. Its shell helps it protect itself by tucking its limbs inside its shell and stopping the predators from doing harm to the turtle. Green Sea Turtles shells weigh an average of 150kg.

Habitat

Green Sea Turtles habitat is warm tropical or subtropical waters and mostly stay close to the coastline, they have coral reefs that are in rich seaweeds, and in coastal seagrass.

Predators

The Green Sea Turtles are Endangered. Green Sea Turtles do not have that many predators which include Sharks and Terrestrial Mammals, including Humans. The Reason is Humans are a predator to the Green Sea Turtles is because Green Sea Turtles are threatened by overharvesting their eggs, hunting for adult, being caught in fishing gear and loss of nesting beach sites.

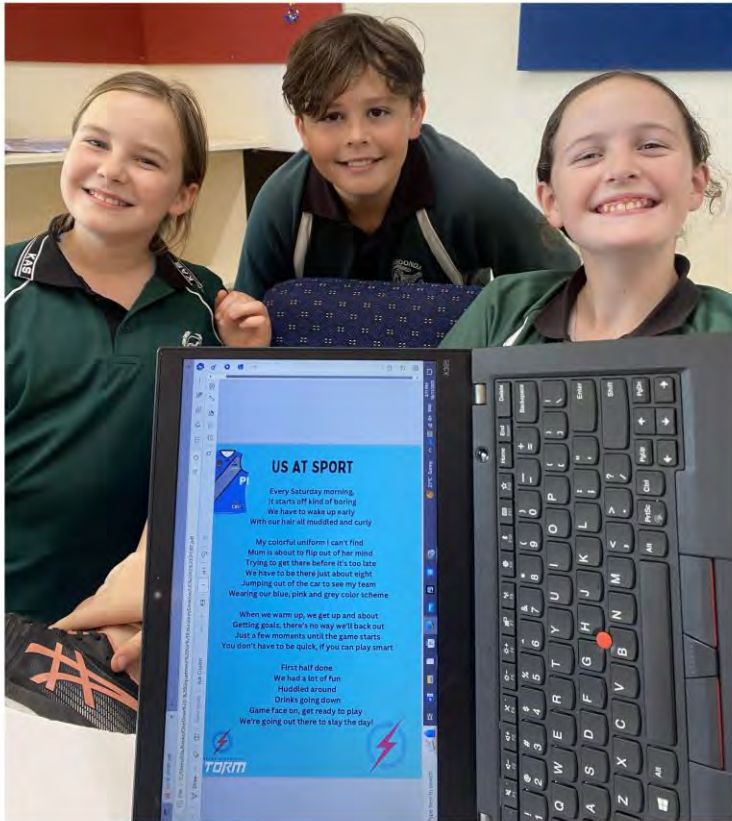
Diet and Prey

The Green Sea Turtles are herbivorous, which means they only eat plants. They eat algae, seagrass, though they may also forage on sponges, invertebrates, and discard fish. The Green Sea Turtles prey is several types of Crabs.

Green sea Turtles can lay up to 100 eggs.

The Green Sea Turtle is up to 3 to 4 feet long.

Between the 7th and 9th of November, Jasba Salter and Seth McKenzie represented the Murray Mallee in the SAPSASA Cricket Carnival in Adelaide. The first two days consisted of two 20/20 matches, before playing an extended 36 over game on the final day. After seven weeks of grueling trials, the boys had the opportunity to play at Park 25 on day 1 and adjusted well to the warm temperatures to convincingly defeat Northern Yorke Peninsula by 60 runs and Kangaroo Island by 30 runs. With the knowledge that Port Pirie had a very inexperienced side, the Mallee boys put on a professional performance to start day 2 with a 110-run win, before locking in a grand final berth by defeating Riverland by 40 runs.

Back at Park 25 for the Division 5 grand final, the boys again had the heat to contend with. After choosing to bowl first, the boys showed great persistence, however, Para Districts put a daunting total of 224 runs on the board. A few early wickets didn't help the team's cause, however Jasba was the shining light, making a quickfire 22, before Seth chimed in with two boundaries in his score of 10. Unfortunately, the boys ended on 118, but represented the region with great pride to be this year's Division 5 silver medalists.

Both Jasba and Seth performed with great consistency and featured with both bat and ball throughout the week. Jasba retired on multiple occasions with the bat, with Seth making several double-digit scores.

A great thank you must go out to all parents, family members and the students for making the carnival such a positive and enjoyable experience, whilst showcasing the talent we are lucky enough to possess in the Murray Mallee.


We have only two more Storytimes ↓ until the end of the year and note the change of date for the final Storytime. These will be Sue's final 2 Storytimes as she is retiring in January.





How to apply for a Tax File Number

Looking for something to do in the school holidays, which is just around the corner? Well, I have just the idea. Why don't you encourage your young person to apply for a tax file number (TFN)?



It is Free!

A tax file number (TFN) is a personal reference number in the tax and superannuation systems. At times part time jobs become available in and around Karoonda, why not be organised and already have a TFN?

Australian residents can apply for a TFN at any age.

The fastest way to apply is online using myGovID, however you will need to be 15 years old or older and have a passport to apply online using myGovID.

If you don't have a passport or are under 15 years old, use one of the other application options:

- Apply at the Murray Bridge Post Office, using an online form.
- A Service Australia Centre.
- Apply by post.

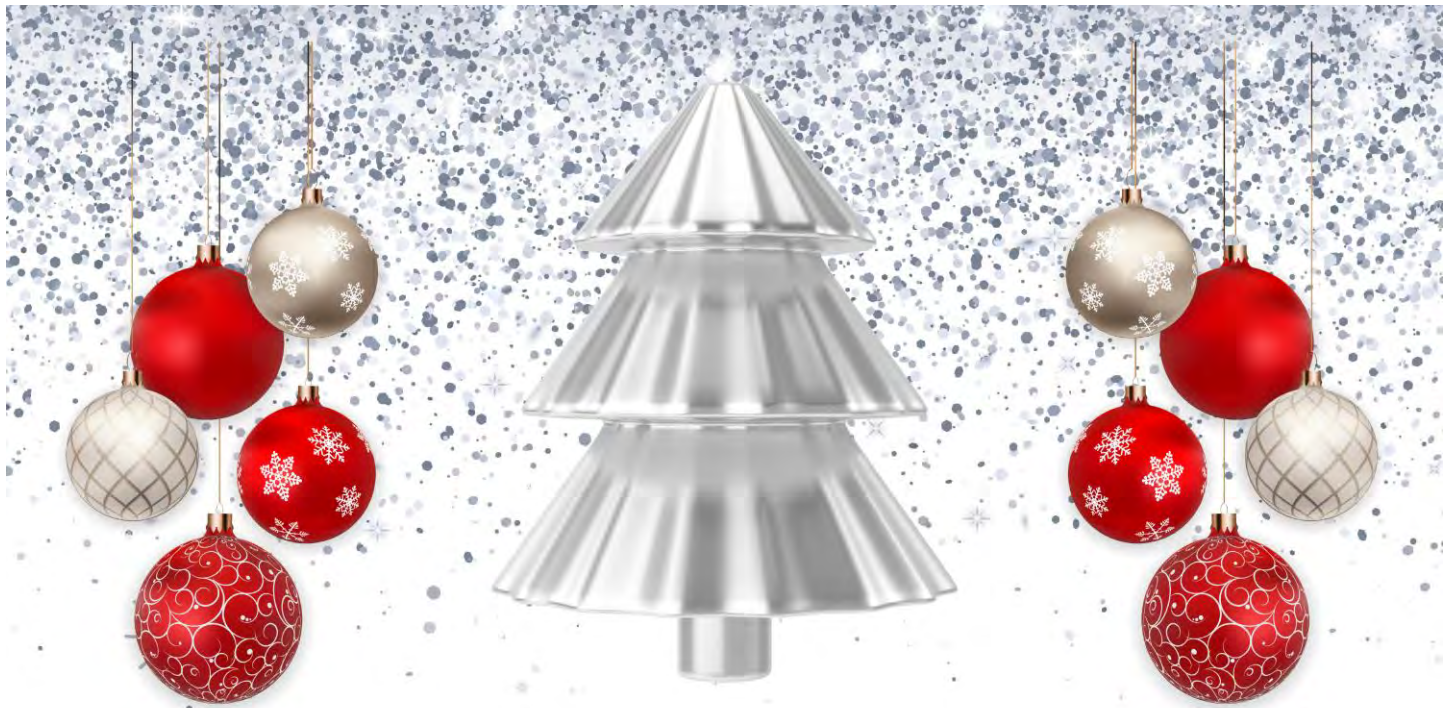
